This presentation explores the choices in civilization's development, marked by growing complexity, power dynamics, and spiritual purpose. It traces archaeological markers from food surpluses to state power and social stratification, questioning if we recognize watershed moments like the AI Revolution, contrasting it with gradual past innovations such as writing.

Religion serves as the moral foundation, with Zoroastrianism, Judaism, Christianity, Islam, and the Bahá'í Faith, emphasizing ethics like Justice and Unity over technology. Applied to AI, it examines if technological utility justifies costs like job displacement and resource use, ultimately defining the ethical civilization we build today.

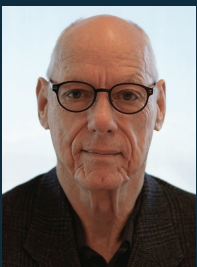
